## Psalms 65:1-13

(Psalms 65:3) When we were overwhelmed by sins, you forgave our transgressions.

(Psalms 65:4) Blessed are those you choose and bring near to live in your courts! We are filled with the good things of your house, of your holy temple.

(Psalms 65:5) You answer us with awesome and righteous deeds, God our Savior, the hope of all the ends of the earth and of the farthest seas,

(Psalms 65:6) who formed the mountains by your power, having armed yourself with strength,

(Psalms 65:7) who stilled the roaring of the seas, the roaring of their waves, and the turmoil of the nations.

(Psalms 65:8) The whole earth is filled with awe at your wonders; where morning dawns, where evening fades, you call forth songs of joy.

(Psalms 65:9) You care for the land and water it; you enrich it abundantly. The streams of God are filled with water to provide the people with grain, for so you have ordained it.

(Psalms 65:10) You drench its furrows and level its ridges; you soften it with showers and bless its crops.
