International Bible Lesson Prayer

Please help us become more like Your first disciples and increase our faith daily as You remain an ever-present help in living the Christ-like life before a watching world.

Lord Jesus, we joyfully worship You as the Son of God both because of who You are and because our Heavenly Father has given You all authority in heaven and on earth—You deserve our praise and loyalty forevermore. Please anoint and fill us with Your Holy Spirit that we might have the courage, power, and wisdom to obey everything that You have commanded and teach others to do the same. We do depend on You and Your presence with us throughout the day and every day. Please help us serve You and others as good and faithful witnesses to Your forgiveness, redeeming love, and transforming grace. In Your Name we pray. Amen.

Please Note: I first learned about “Praying Through the Bible” from Edith Schaeffer, the wife of Francis Schaeffer. You might like to close your class with the above prayer as

a way of beginning to teach your class how they too can pray through the Bible. First, you might like to teach your class how to pray through the *International Bible Lessons* each week. [Perhaps some of them would learn how to pray through portions of the Bible during their daily Bible reading and quiet time.] Second, a week in advance, perhaps some of your students would like to write their own “Prayer Through the Bible” using the *International Bible Lesson* scripture text and read their prayer at the close of class. Third, eventually, your students will be able to pray through the Bible without needing to write their prayer in advance before they pray at the end of class.
