

Reasons for Disobedience

“Withal praying also for us, that God would open unto us a door of utterance, to speak the mystery of Christ, for which I am also in bonds: That I may make it manifest, as I ought to speak” (Colossians 4:3, 4—KJV).

“At the same time pray also for us, so that God will give us a good opportunity to preach his message about the secret of Christ. For that is why I am now in prison. Pray, then, that I may speak, as I should, in such a way as to make it clear” (Colossians 4:3, 4—GNB).

“At the same time pray for us as well that God will open to us a door for the word, that we may declare the mystery of Christ, for which I am in prison, so that I may reveal it clearly, as I should” (Colossians 4:3, 4—NRSV).

Evil religious and political leaders imprisoned and persecuted the apostles, because the apostles acted on their beliefs and publicly declared; “We must obey God rather than any human authority” (Acts 5:29). When they chose to obey their King, Jesus Christ, first and foremost, they knew they would suffer the consequences from their evil leaders. In answer to the prayers of His people, God sometimes worked miracles and freed His beloved from prison (see Acts 5:12-33; Acts 12:1-17). At other times, God gave His chosen ones the strength to die for their faith in the true King of the universe; just as James, the brother of John, died at King Herod’s command (Acts 12:2). Both the

Old and New Testaments give examples of how those loyal to God sometimes need to disobey civil and religious authorities for the sake of God's kingdom, for the sake those God loves (born and unborn), and for the sake of a humane future on Earth.

Paul's prayer requests from prison seem remarkable. He did not pray to avoid suffering; rather, Paul wanted prayers "that God will open to us a door for the word" that he might "declare the mystery of Christ" and "reveal it clearly." God answered and opened "a door for the word," because for almost 2,000 years people have studied Paul's letters from prison about the mystery of Christ. In order to keep open "a door for the word," believers must pray to stand wisely against evil.
